

GLADSTONE REGIONAL COUNCIL CONSIDERS LEASE OF BYELLEE WETLANDS FOR YARALLA SPORTS CLUB'S

Golf Course Expansion


In a recent council meeting held on January 16th the Gladstone Regional Council deliberated on the proposal to lease a portion of Lot 32 on PL646, part of the Byellee Wildlife Reserve, Yaralla Sports Club.

he General Manager of Assets and Environment presented the agenda item, outlining the terms and conditions of the proposed lease and the associated recommendation for approval.

The recommendation suggests that Council resolves to apply the relevant section of the Local Government Regulation 2012, allowing the lease of part of Lot 32 to Yaralla Sports Club. The terms include an initial lease period of five years, an option for a further five-year term, and a nominal annual rent of \$1.00. Furthermore, Yaralla would have the option to purchase the lease area at market value, subject to certain conditions related to the development of a golf course and obtaining necessary approvals.

Yaralla Sports Club seeks to acquire approximately seven hectares of Lot 32 to facilitate the creation of a championship-level golf course. The proposal aligns with the Corporate Plan's goals of being an Accountable Council, Connecting Communities, and contributing to a Resilient Economy.

Background information reveals that the Council had previously considered a request to dispose of parts of freehold land adjacent to Yaralla's proposed development. Initial concerns included potential risks to bird species, loss of vegetation, and environmental impact.



However, Yaralla's clarification that the request pertains to only seven hectares of Lot 32 has mitigated some of these concerns.

The risk management summary presented by the officers highlights the potential impact on wildlife and the environment. Nevertheless, information provided by Yaralla and their consultants, detailing the nature of the operation and proposed environmental stewardship, has reduced the risk profile.

The Council is presented with two options: to approve the lease to Yaralla as recommended or to reject the request, which could compromise the development according to Yaralla.

Stakeholder engagement involved consultations with various teams, including Strategic Property
Management, Asset Planning,
Environment and Conservation, and
Governance. Legal and regulatory implications, as well as financial and resource considerations, were also discussed during the meeting.

The resolution, passed by the council majority, outlines the specific terms and conditions of the proposed lease to Yaralla Sports Club.

- 1. Resolves that \$236(1)(b)(ii) of the Local Government Regulation 2012 applies to the proposed lease of part of Lot 32 on PL646 to Clava Ltd trading as Yaralla Sports Club ("Yaralla") on the following terms and conditions:
- a. An initial term of five years;
- b. An option for a further term of five years;
- c. At a rental of \$1.00 per annum payable on demand;
- d. Such other terms and conditions that the Chief Executive Officer deems appropriate in the circumstances;
- 2. Authorises the Chief Executive Officer to negotiate, finalise and execute any and all matters associated with or in relation to the Lease; and
- 3. That Council continue to negotiate the purchase of the lease area with Yaralla and bring a further report to Council to discuss the options.

If approved, the proposed lease is expected to commence on July 1, 2024. The decision underscores the delicate balance between economic development and environmental conservation, with the Council striving to meet the needs of the community while safeguarding the Byellee Wetlands.

Facelift to take place along popular stretch within CBD

Gladstone Regional Council will soon commence work to revamp a section of road bordering the Gladstone Central Business District.

The Glenlyon Street (Bramston St to Herbert St) Road Upgrade will involve significant road pavement renewal and widening along Glenlyon St (north and southbound lanes), with footpath work, kerb and channel replacement, removal and installation of road signs and landscape works within the median strip also taking place.

Works will commence from Monday 5 February and continue until late June 2024, site conditions and weather permitting.

Gladstone Region Mayor Matt Burnett said these upcoming works will improve asset performance and longevity, while reducing ongoing maintenance costs for road infrastructure in the

"Works will be conducted across four stages, beginning with Stage 1 which involves the

southbound footpath works along Glenlyon Street," Councillor Burnett said.

"Stage 2 will see work carried out on the North and Southbound Central lanes median strip, Stage 3 will concentrate on the North and Southbound outside lanes and Stage 4 will see final asphalt and line-marking works take place in all areas.

"During these works, the area of road being worked on will close to traffic, with detours required, so please factor this into your daily commute if using this stretch of road.

"Where practicable, works will be planned to consider peak hour traffic times with detail about any significant disruptions to residences or businesses shared ahead of work starting."

The Glenlyon St (Bramston-Herbert St) Road Upgrade project is funded by the Queensland Government's Transport Infrastructure Development Scheme (TIDS) (\$256,651) and Gladstone Regional Council (\$202,935).

Bundaberg Rum Takes a Stand AGAINST SPIRALING SPIRITS TAX

Our famous neighbors, Bundaberg Rum is boldly challenging the tax policies in Canberra, advocating for a freeze on the escalating spirits tax rates.

he iconic Australian spirits brand has initiated a campaign across its home state, drawing attention to Australia's punitive taxation regime, where a staggering 63% of the cost of a 1L bottle of Bundaberg Rum UP goes directly to the federal government in excise.

From Cairns to Caboolture, Yeppoon to Yeronga, and Rockhampton to Redbank Plains, Bundaberg Rum will unveil a series of billboards, radio spots, and social media advertisements to encourage the Federal Government to halt the semi-annual increases to the spirits tax rate.

Australia currently boasts the third-highest spirits tax in the world, trailing behind only Iceland and Norway. The spirits industry is expected to contribute approximately \$5 billion in excise this year alone, with the tax consistently growing twice a year. This mounting tax burden, now at \$100 per litre of alcohol as of last August, is placing additional strain on Australian distilleries, ranging from major players like Bundy to small, family-run operations.

Amanda Lampe, Chair of the Bundaberg Distilling Co., emphasised the challenges faced by consumers as the tax on alcohol continues to rise. Lampe stated, "We know alcohol should be taxed, but a 63% tax on a 1L bottle of Bundy UP just seems outrageous. We do our best to keep our products affordable amid rising costs, but the current

tax structure poses a real challenge."

Acknowledging that the issue predates the current Federal Government, Lampe urged them to address the problem by freezing excise on spirits. "The tax on Bundy is frankly too much to bear," she added.

The Australian Distillers Association's CEO, Paul McLeay, commended Bundaberg Rum for taking a stance against the escalating spirits tax. McLeay highlighted the widespread impact of these tax policies on Australia's 600 spirits distilleries, including small and emerging operations. He urged the government to reconsider policies that hinder the potential growth of Australia's spirits industry, noting the adverse effects on tourism and manufacturing.

"If the Australian Government wants to encourage our tourism and manufacturing industries, then it should stop and think about the impact of policies like this one, which serves as a handbrake on the potential of Australia's spirits industry," McLeay concluded.

Here in History

GLADSTONE'S PART IN WWII

When World War Two broke out, the Gladstone Council was advised that the protection of civil undertakings was its responsibility.

/ / ithin a week the council received instructions on national emergency services.

For the Gladstonites left at home it was a time when ration books and identity cards were used to buy goods and they had air raid shelters built in their back yards. There was no sport on weekends, but everyone was kept busy helping with the war efforts.

By 1942, the war had reached the Pacific and Darwin was heavily bombed in February of that year. Over five hundred men and women had enlisted from the Gladstone area and the Queensland coast was in real danger of being attacked. By March, RAAF single seated fighters began flying over Gladstone and heading north on their way to defend places like Port Moresby and Milne Bay.

Next, ships of the Australian and US navy began to appear in the Gladstone harbour and there were armed guards on the wharves so that unauthorised civilians couldn't intrude. The US 41st Division troops, numbering about 8000, arrived in June 1942 and they camped mainly in tents around Gladstone and Rockhampton. Gladstone became a busy town, with visits of crew from Australian and US Naval vessels and merchant ships, which were frequently in the harbour.

Prawn Mango Avocado SUMMER SALAD

Salad:

- 2.5 cups cooked risoni or orzo
- 300 400g cooked peeled prawns
- · 1 large mango, cut 1.5cm / ½" pieces
- 1 large ripe avocado, cut 1.5cm / ½" pieces
- 75 g rocket, roughly chopped
- · 250 g cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1/2 red onion, finely sliced
- 1/4 cup coriander finely chopped

- · 4 tbsp (60 ml) extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tbsp (30 ml) lime juice (fresh), plus more to taste
- · 1 small garlic clove, minced
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp black pepper

METHOD

- 1. Shake Dressing in a jar.
- 2. Chop prawns into 1.75 2 cm / 2/3" pieces.
- 3. Place all Salad Ingredients in a bowl, pour over dressing. Toss very gently using rubber spatula. Adjust to taste with more lime if desired. Serve immediately!
