Turtle Season has begun!

Heron Island, a National Marine Park situated in the southern end of the Great Barrier Reef, is a significant nesting location for two threatened sea turtle species, the Green Turtle and the Loggerhead Turtle.

Year after year these turtles return on the high tide to nest in the sandy dunes from late October to early March.

Late December marks the beginning of baby Green and Loggerhead Turtle hatching season, a cycle that will continue into May. Undeterred by human presence the hatchlings erupt from their nests between 25 to 50 metres from shore and make their way to the reef, just beyond the water's edge. During this journey, the hatchlings will be imprinting on the environment, so they know to return to these beaches as mature adults. This crossing from nest to ocean also gives hatchlings the opportunity to warm up their flippers in preparation for their big ocean journey.

For guests, the opportunity to see turtles nesting or hatchlings erupting, is as simple as taking a stroll around the island at sunset or sunrise. As a worldrenowned haven for turtles, guests at Heron Island are given strict guidelines for the viewing of turtles to minimise disturbance to these magnificent marine reptiles. Naturalist guides on Heron Island also lead complimentary educational tours for

observing the turtles and hatchlings.

Calling Heron Island home, Master Reef Guide and Marine Biologist, Catie Streng gets to witness this wondrous lifecycle of the turtles and their hatchlings each year.

"During our complimentary sunrise and sunset turtle walks guests are amazed by the experience of seeing a turtle nesting or the tiny hatchlings erupting to make their dash out to sea. It is such a privilege to pass on my knowledge of sea turtles to our guests, who are enthusiastic to know how they can protect these endangered reptiles during their stay at Heron Island and also when they go back home," commented Streng.

Although you can swim with turtles year-round at Heron Island, from late October to early March, endangered Loggerhead and Green Sea Turtles return on the high tide to nest in the dunes. Then from December to April, be enchanted by hatchlings as they begin to erupt from their nests.

Enpowering Gladstone INNOVATIVE TRAINING FOR HUMAN SERVICE SECTOR

In a proactive move aimed at addressing critical skills shortages in the Gladstone Region, the local community has come together to identify and prioritise training needs for practitioners in the human services sector.

he initiative, born out of the Gladstone Region Wellbeing Action Plan, emphasises the importance of collaborative capacity building to achieve continuous improvement within the service system. A key component of this plan is the identification of priority training and professional development required for local practitioners, with the ultimate goal of enhancing the quality and timeliness of support for clients.

Several events, including the **Combined Interagency Meeting** on March 1st 2023 and the GAPDL Communities for Children Professional Networking on the Green event on March 21st 2023, played a pivotal role in gathering insights and endorsing the Gladstone Region Together (GRT) to spearhead a funding proposal.

Recognising the challenges of fair access to training, Rio Tinto has stepped up to partner with the local human service sector in this threeyear initiative. Their contribution will directly fund training costs, covering everything from trainer fees to travel and accommodation expenses.

The collective community project is expected to yield far-reaching benefits, including sector-wide participation in priority training at an affordable co-contribution price, upskilling of service sector staff, improved retention, readiness for role succession, shared practices and resources among referring services, continuity of support for clients, and enhanced service system integration.

As the project unfolds, GRT, funded by the Stronger Places, Stronger People initiative, will play a crucial

facilitating ongoing sector feedback, coordinating training logistics, evaluating individual training outcomes, covering venue costs, and assessing the overall success impact of the initiative.

A Sector Training – Mapping and Planning Workshop is also scheduled to engage stakeholders in shaping the future of workforce development. This collective effort represents a unique opportunity to foster workforce and sector development, ultimately leading to improved early supports and opportunities for Gladstone children and families.

ACCONIA Community Hub

As of February 1st, ACCIONA Energia proudly established its Community Hub on Goondoon Street in Gladstone, marking a significant milestone for the 480MWp Aldoga Solar Farm project.

he establishment of this hub serves a dual purpose, functioning as both a centralised space for the project team in the pre-construction phase and a valuable resource centre for individuals keen on exploring job opportunities and gaining insights into the project's intricacies within the local community. This dynamic initiative underscores ACCIONA Energia's commitment not only to the successful development of the Aldoga Solar Farm but also to fostering community engagement, knowledgesharing, and providing a platform for those interested in contributing to or learning more about the project. The Community Hub stands as a tangible embodiment of ACCIONA Energia's dedication to transparency, collaboration, and the seamless integration of the project within the fabric of the Gladstone community.

In total, the Aldoga Solar Farm will create at least 350 construction jobs over its 18 month construction period. "The 350 construction jobs are great in the short term, however more importantly this project will help secure a renewable energy supply for Gladstone's new and existing industries supporting thousands of jobs in the long term." Says Mayor Matt Burnett. The entirety of the energy produced by the Aldoga Solar Farm will be supplied to Stanwell Corporation for the Central Queensland Hydrogen Project (CQ-H2), fostering the creation of new employment opportunities and skill development in the green hydrogen sector.

In addition to the 350 construction roles integral to the project, the Aldoga Solar Farm is set to contribute significantly to the local economy by facilitating the movement of 2500 containers through the Port of Gladstone. This operation will not only enhance the efficiency of the port but also create additional employment opportunities along the entire supply chain. Early preparatory work has already commenced at the solar farm, gearing up the site for construction commencement in March. The first wave of progress includes the expected arrival of the initial 25 container loads of equipment at the Port of Gladstone later this month, marking the beginning of a substantial phase in the solar farm's development.

The Gladstone Healthy Harbour Partnership (GHHP) celebrated the launch of its ninth annual Gladstone Harbour Report Card on Thursday 1st February containing new results for environmental and economic health of the harbour, and continued results for social and cultural components.

ladstone Harbour's annual Report Card offers a comprehensive assessment of its environmental, social, economic, and cultural well-being across 33 different indicators, graded from 'very good' (A) to 'very poor' (E).

According to the report, the environmental health of Gladstone Harbour remained stable, maintaining an overall 'satisfactory' (C) grade. Economic performance retained its 'very good' (A) rating, while economic stimulus held a 'satisfactory' (C) grade, mirroring previous years. Social and cultural indicators reused their 2022 grades due to stable trends.

GHHP's Independent Science Panel Chair, Professor John Rolfe, explained that while there haven't been any changes in the overall results, the results obtained for individual indicators such as Water and Sediment Quality, Mud Crabs and Economic Performance show promising signs for the region.

"From an environmental perspective, we're pleased to see that, overall, the harbour's Water and Sediment Quality received a 'very good' (A) grade for the seventh year in a row, despite the higher-than-average rainfall recorded in the second half of 2022.

"What is perhaps most encouraging is the improvement we've seen in Mud Crab results this year," continued John. "After five years of receiving a 'poor' (D) grade, the overall grade has finally improved to a 'satisfactory' (C).

Some indicators experienced slight declines, with Seagrass dropping from 'good' (B) to 'satisfactory' (C) and Fish Recruitment slipping from 'satisfactory' (C) to 'poor' (D) in 2023.

From an economic standpoint, the harbour maintains robust performance, achieving a 'good' (B) grade for the ninth consecutive year. Economic performance receives a 'very good' (A) rating, reflecting the continued strength of shipping and tourism.

The report also includes results from the Urban Water Stewardship Management framework review, indicating that Gladstone Regional Council's urban water management practices align with current standards.

GHHP Independent Chair, Professor Iain Gordon, commended the ongoing support and collaboration of partners. The report underscores the combined efforts of government, industry, Traditional Owners, research, and the community in ensuring the harbour's sustained health and vitality.

RIO TINTO TAKES LEAD IN ESTABLISHING AUSTRALIA'S BIGGEST solar farm in Gladstone

Rio Tinto is set to lead the development of Australia's largest solar farm in Calliope, expected to occur in 2025 or 2026.

nce approvals are secured, the construction of the solar farms are expected to take between 1-2 years. This strategic move aims to boost renewable power sources in one of Australia's key industrial hubs, showcasing their commitment to advancing sustainable energy initiatives.

They have taken a decisive step towards a greener future by announcing their intention to obtain a substantial 1.1 gigawatts of solar power from the Upper Calliope Solar Farm. The pledge secures exclusive access for the company to the entire renewable energy output generated by the solar farm facility for an impressive 25-year term, showcasing a long-term commitment to sustainable energy practices.

Here in History GLADSTONE: A NORTHERN COLONY & INTENDED CONVICT SETTLEMENT

On 17th February 1846, Queen Victoria signed Letters Patent establishing the Colony of North Australia, and the British government passed a law to define its boundaries.

ieutenant Colonel George Barney was appointed Lieutenant Governor and superintendent of North Australia to administer the new colony on behalf of Governor Fitzroy. In September 1846, Barney arrived back in Sydney in the William Hyde, having received his new commission for the secretary of State for the Colonies, William Ewart Gladstone.



Colonel George Barney was sent

to explore the northern colony for a suitable place for a convict settlement. He hired the small paddle-wheel steamer, Cornubia, a vessel of some ninety-four tons and set sail from Sydney in November 1846. The vessel called in at Bustard Bay and Rodds Harbour, but both these places were declared unsuitable. When they reached Port Curtis however, Barney was immediately impressed with the area.

When Barney arrived back in Sydney, Governor Fitzroy was engaged in organising the early dispatch of the first contingent of colonists and officials. Colonel George Barney oversaw the party that left Sydney 8th January 1847 aboard the Lord Auckland, a 516-ton barque. Brown and Co owned this ship, and the skipper was none other than the owner himself Captain Brown. On board was the official party, consisting of twenty-two men of the 99th regiment, seven women and twelve children. Fitzroy also chartered the Thomas Lowry to assist, and this ship was to follow soon after with the balance of stores and the rest of the personnel. Fitzroy purchased the Kangaroo, a small steamer, and this was to become a regular service craft between Moreton Bay and Port Curtis.

The statue of William Ewart Gladstone is installed in the Gladstone Regional Art Gallery and Museum.

Crispy pork stin-gry WITH BABY BROCCOLI

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tbsp vegetable oil, divided
- 1 bunch baby broccoli, florets separated, stems thinly sliced
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- \cdot 3 tsp finely chopped peeled ginger
- 2 spring onions, white and green parts separated and thinly sliced
- 500g Regular Pork Mince
- 1/4 cup (60ml) Pearl River Bridge Soy Sauce
- 1 tsp Cornflour
- 1 tsp White Sugar
- 2 cups (400g) Long Grain White Rice, steamed

METHOD

- Heat a large heavy frying pan over high heat. Add 1 tablespoon oil. When oil is smoking, cook baby broccoli, tossing, for 2 mins or until brown in spots and crisptender. Transfer to a plate.
- 2. Return pan to high heat and add remaining 1 tbs oil. When oil is smoking, add garlic, ginger and white parts of spring onions. Stir for 30 secs or until fragrant. Add pork and cook, breaking up with a spoon, for 3 mins or until pork is cooked through. Spread pork in an even layer and cook, without moving, for 3 mins or until crisp underneath.
- 3. In a small bowl, whisk soy sauce, cornflour, white sugar and 1/3 cup (80ml) water. Add to pork mixture with baby broccoli. Cook, tossing, for 30 secs. Divide rice among serving plates and spoon stir-fry over. Top with remaining spring onions.

Gas supply concerns 66 FOR AUSTRALIA Area

Australia's oil and gas industry is urging the government to address gas supply concerns in the upcoming Federal Budget, emphasizing the need to avert projected shortages, reduce prices, and capitalise on the economic and emissions reduction advantages of the country's abundant natural gas resources.

he 2024-25 Federal Budget submission from Australian Energy Producers emphasizes the necessity for a strategic plan to prevent impending shortfalls on both coasts, ensuring continued access to affordable and reliable energy for homes and businesses.

Samantha McCulloch, Chief Executive of Australian Energy Producers, said: "After more than a year of policy instability, government interventions and project approval delays, a recalibration of the policy and investment environment for natural gas is needed to secure our energy future." The industry calls for the release of new acreage for petroleum exploration, which has been on hold since August 2022, and the resumption of overdue annual acreage releases.

The submission underscores the industry's concern over the potential permanence of price controls in the east coast gas market, urging the government to outline a plan to restore market signals and incentivise new supply before the scheduled 2025 review of the Code of Conduct. Additionally, the government is urged to review energy needs for critical minerals processing, ensuring a stable gas supply for manufacturing the minerals essential for achieving net-zero emissions.

Australian Energy Producers also highlights the long-term role of natural gas in Australia's energy transition to net zero, emphasising the growing opportunities for LNG exports to support regional emissions reductions. The call for urgent action includes proposed measures such as streamlining environmental approvals, addressing the offshore regulatory system, and establishing an Australian LNG Producer-Consumer Taskforce to enhance regional relationships and leverage potential growth in Asian LNG demand.

A recalibration of the policy and investment environment for natural gas is needed to secure our energy future.

Furthermore, the submission advocates for Australia to become a regional carbon capture, utilisation, and storage (CCUS) hub. This includes the development of a national roadmap and the creation of Net Zero Zones to expedite emissions reductions.

Ms McCulloch said: "Carbon capture is part of the net zero pathway in a multitude of ways – such as lowering emissions from industries, unlocking low carbon hydrogen and supporting carbon removal. It can also be a major economic driver for Australia through new jobs and investment."
