

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF ROCKHAMPTON HAVE BEEN INVITED TO HONOUR THE ELDERLY IN THEIR COMMUNITIES AS PART OF THIS YEAR'S CELEBRATION OF CATHOLIC EDUCATION WEEK WHICH RUNS FROM JULY 28 TO AUGUST 3.

"We need to hear their stories and know their past. They are our living treasures and valued and cherished members of our community," Rockhampton Catholic Education Director, Leesa Jeffcoat said.

Miss Jeffcoat said each year during Catholic Education Week schools aim to participate in a simultaneous act of kindness or outreach and this year schools will be part of a special effort to foster greater compassion and respect for the elderly in their communities.

"Our school communities participate in regular outreach to the elderly through visits to aged care homes, special invitations to school events for grandparents, great-grandparents and senior parishioners and during Catholic Education Week this year schools

will seek to deepen this experience to exemplify the high regard and honour owed our older citizens," Miss Jeffcoat said.

"As Catholic schools we share in the mission of the Catholic Church. Part of that mission is protecting the dignity of life in all forms and a greater respect and care for those in need, including the frail and elderly," Miss Jeffcoat said.

"The debate around end of life care and the periodic spotlight on euthanasia requires that we as Church continue to provide a perspective that upholds the value of life at all stages, and that the value of life does not diminish with age or physical or mental capability," Miss Jeffcoat said.

Miss Jeffcoat referenced comments from Pope Francis' about the Church's regard for the elderly where he states, "The Church regards the elderly with affection, gratitude, and high esteem. They are an essential part of the Christian community and of society: in particular they represent the roots and the memory of a people. You are an important presence, because your experience is a

precious treasure, which is essential if we would look to the future with hope and responsibility.'

"By engaging in dialogue, building relationships and deepening connections with our elderly we hope to honour their story and appropriately recognise their standing in our schools, parishes and wider community and heed with gratitude their wisdom and experience as we follow in footsteps already forged," Miss Jeffcoat said.

Catholic Education Week is celebrated by 20 000 staff and 149 000 students in Queensland's 306 Catholic schools and colleges to celebrate and promote their distinctive mission and ethos through a range of activities, liturgies, awards and celebrations.

This year's state launch will be held at St Joseph's Cathedral, Rockhampton, hosted by Catholic Education, Diocese of Rockhampton on Wednesday 31 July which will feature Mass and presentation of the 2019 Spirit of Catholic Education Awards.

REACH NATIONAL AEROBICS COMP

Gladstone West State School students have another reason to boast that West is Best! Since the introduction of the Sports Aerobics program at the school this year, students have been enjoying taking up their new challenge.

West School PE teacher and Aerobics team coach, Margaret-Mary Opstelten, affectionately known as Mrs O, said that Sports Aerobics offers a high-intensity dance and stunt performance in a team environment. "Sport Aerobics doesn't require any equipment – so it was very attractive to start up," Mrs O said. "We also got great support from FISAF (governing body on Australia – Federation of International Sport Aerobics and Fitness) with National development officers visiting the Gladstone region to promote the benefits of the sport."

Three teams from the school competed at the Queensland Championships in June, the very first competition for the students. Mrs O said as it was their first comp the teams did not expect to place, just compete and learn heaps. However, at the event, all the hard work and training paid off with all three teams qualifying to compete at the upcoming National Championships in August.

"Our three teams competing were Year 1 team West Wonders, Year 3/4 team Wild Westies and year 5/6 team West Warriors. All teams competed in the pre-choreographed category for their level," Mrs O explained. The Year 1 team achieved first place in their competition and the Year 3/4 team achieved 2nd place. The Year 5/6 West Warriors team achieved 4th and were fortunately granted automatic wildcard qualification to Nationals

Mrs O explained that the Nationals would be held from the 8th to 11th of August with all Gladstone West teams competing on 10 August. "Everyone is a bit overwhelmed that this has all happened so quickly – we never expected to do so well at a State level," Mrs O said.

"The three Gladstone West teams worked really hard to get where that have – before school training and sometimes missing their playtime to train. This is a credit to the children and their parents – without their work ethic these results would not have been possible," Mrs O added. "Along with the prestige of being selected to compete at the National level comes a financial burden, which has been lightened by generous sponsors. A huge thank you to Bill Robertson Toyota, Willy Ed's Music Accessories, GPS Realty Group and The Gladstone Regional Council for their financial support to enable these teams to represent the region and state."




Healthy Lunch Box Snacks

Vegetable Crisps

When my children started school as a mum one of my biggest nightmares was packing the school lunchbox. I wanted to be sure that my children ate healthy foods at school as they would at home. I remember my son telling me one day how the home cooked popcorn I made was a great trading tool for Smith Crisps. So, here is a recipe that may stop that problem of the lunch box swap.



BETROOT CHIPS

- 2 Beetroot
- 2 Tbsp Coconut Oil Melted
- Sea salt

Preheat oven to 140 degrees Celsius or 120 degrees Celsius for fan forced oven.

Line 3 or 4 baking trays with baking paper.

To make the beetroot chips be sure to wear gloves to avoid staining your hands. Cut into 2mm thick slices. Place the beetroot slices in trays as a single layer and bake for 30 minutes.

Rotate the trays and bake for a further 20 minutes until the beetroot is crisp at the edges. Store in an airtight container for up to 2 weeks.

POTATO & PARSNIP CHIPS

- 500ml (2 cups coconut oil or good quality animal fat)
- 1 sweet potato - thinly sliced (about 240g)
- 1 large parsnip - thinly sliced (about 280g)
- Sea salt

Melt the oil or fat in a large saucepan over a medium - high heat until the temperature reaches about 160 degree Celsius, to test drop a sweet potato or parsnip slice into the hot oil, if it starts bubbling straight away it is ready.

Fry the sliced sweet potato and parsnip separately in batches for about 2 - 3 1/2 minutes until just starting to colour. Remove from the oil and drain on paper towel, season with salt. Store in an airtight container for up to 3 days.

kale chips

- 1 bunch Kale
- 1 tablespoon coconut oil (melted)
- 1/2 teaspoon favourite spice
- Sea salt

Pre heat oven to 120 degree Celsius or 100 degree Celsius for fan forced oven. Line with baking paper. Wash the kale thoroughly in cold water and pat dry. Remove and discard the tough central stems, then cut the leaves into smaller pieces.

In a large bowl, toss the kale with some coconut oil, spice (if using) and a little salt. Spread the kale on the baking tray in a single layer; do not overcrowd. Use more than one baking tray if required. Roast the kale for 35-40 minutes until crispy. Serve immediately or store in an airtight container for up to two weeks.

LOVE YOUR SISTER

SAMUEL JOHNSON IS WAGING A FORMIDABLE FIGHT AGAINST CANCER, WITH ADMIRABLE DEDICATION.

"We need personalised treatment for all cancer patients, no matter the Cancer or where they live. It's that simple," Samuel Johnson.

Gladstone News chatted with Sam recently when he brought the Love Your Sister national tour to town. While visiting Sam had a tight schedule which included school visits, meetings with health care providers and event appearances. With his Dancing with the Stars Mirror ball trophy, Gold Logie and tap shoes in tow, Sam was rattling the tin and taking the opportunity to 'cut sick on every available dancefloor!' - all for a good cause.

Love Your Sister was created seven years ago, by Sam and his beloved sister Connie's following her terminal breast cancer diagnosis. Connie initially dared Sam to raise \$1M by riding a unicycle around Australia. Upon his return, Connie reminded him that the fight wasn't over. From there, Sam upped the ante and set a new mission; to raise \$10M for research and tell every mum in the land to be breast aware! Sam explained that Connie had passed away around 18 months ago, and Sam is finishing their pledge in her name.

When Gladstone News spoke to Sam, the fundraising tally had reached \$9.6M just \$400K of his \$10M target. Sam began his latest tour in Queensland, with the big lap around the nation is a chance for Sam to say thanks! "I have been chasing this dream for seven years now, and the fact that it is so close is just beyond exciting," he said.

With the end in sight, Sam has shifted the goalposts yet again! The new goal; to raise more money for further research and the development of targeted treatments for cancers based on tumour

biology. "Every community in Australia has had its heartbroken by cancer," he said.

"So many people in every town are similarly affected. We are driven by a desire to kick Cancer in the pie hole once and for all. It is a strong connection we share because we want to stop the pain! I often say Cancer is the true terrorist, and I will die shouting about it."

The funds raised by Love Your Sister are going toward a uniform push for personalised medicine for all. "Our focus is heavily on personalised medicine," Sam explained. "We need to use the genome to individually treat each patient, and we need to stop with our hit and hope approach! It's costing lives and wasting millions in false lines of treatment."

Sam said the case for this treatment type is overwhelming. "It must happen soon. I see that as my role to accelerate the progress toward personalised medicine. At the last sitting week in parliament next year, I will present my case."

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


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FOSSIL PUZZLE PLANT DISCOVERY In Gladstone Region

SCIENTISTS FROM QUEENSLAND MUSEUM AND CENTRAL QUEENSLAND UNIVERSITY HAVE MADE AN EXCITING DISCOVERY OF A FOSSIL PLANT ON A SITE NEAR GLADSTONE.

The discovery of the horsetail or puzzle grass specimen is evidence that the plant has survived for at least another 50 million years after it was thought to be extinct in Australia. The tiny specimen was discovered by CQ University Associate Professor Anita Milroy. The fossil is the youngest evidence of the plant group from Australia, and its discovery will help understand the history and distribution of the plant.

The plant first appeared over 300 million years ago. It was commonly found in the Permian-aged coal mines of Central Queensland that are 240- 250 million years old. Before this discovery, the most recent records of these plants are about 90 million years old and come from the Winton area in western Queensland.

Horsetails are a distinctive group of plants that are related to ferns and have hollow stems and small leaves arranged in regular whorls on their stem. The modern horsetail plants are now widely distributed in the northern hemisphere, are recognised as being invasive weeds, and are banned in every state of Australia.


Queensland Museum Acting Head of Biodiversity and Geosciences Dr Andrew Rozefelds said the discovery indicates the plants were still growing here 40 million years ago. "The challenge is to assemble and characterise the traits of these living and fossil plants to better understand the origins and history of this remarkable group," Dr Rozefelds said. Although the horsetails discovery was unexpected, in the future, more intensive field studies and research will provide additional insights into the history of modern Australian flora.

Queensland Museum Network CEO, Dr Jim Thompson said the discovery would provide an opportunity to piece together Queensland's role in the evolution of fossil plants. "It's exciting to be a part of this fascinating and unique story, and we look forward to sharing more research findings in the future."

Future Makers provided support to undertake this initial fieldwork, a partnership between Queensland Museum and Shell's QGC business as part of the World Science Festival Brisbane 2018 with further fieldwork planned with additional support from QGC.



The History of James Boles (Snr)

James Boles (Snr) was born in 1816 in Curragh in Kildare, Ireland. He joined the 15th Hussars in the British Army when he was only twelve years of age. He was sent to India, where he spent the next fifteen years. James married Maria Ainley in Bangalore. Two children were born at Madras while they lived in India, James (Jnr) (1848) and Jason (1850).

In 1852, James left the army, and the family immigrated to Australia. They arrived in Sydney on April 1853. After a short holiday, James was engaged as an orderly with Captain Maurice O'Connell, the Commissioner for Lands for the Burnett District stationed in Gayndah.

The Boles family settled in Gayndah. While James (Snr) working as an orderly for Captain O'Connell, the Captain received an appointment to become the Resident Governor of Port Curtis. This posting saw the Boles family travel to live in Gladstone, which was being surveyed, and there were only a couple of

settlers in the area.

The journey from Gayndah to Gladstone took thirty-two days. They reached their destination 1st April 1854 and pitched their tent at Barney Point.

James and Maria Boles had two more children while in Gladstone. James obtained an appointment with the native police and at the time worked at The Rocks (Rockhampton). This was in the stirring days of the Canoona gold rush.

James retired as a policeman in 1861 and became gold commissioner in 1868. In 1873 the family returned to Gladstone, and during 1875 they opened a boarding house in the lower end of Goondoon Street. The family lived here until James died in 1879 at sixty-three years of age and Maria in 1898 at sixty-eight years. They are both buried in the Gladstone Cemetery.

"The Coalition is backing in our farmers, and we will always stand up and support our drought-affected communities. The Future Drought Fund


is about more than just money - it is about giving our farmers the best possible tools to face drought, now and into the future," Mr O'Dowd added.

"This investment into the Drought Relief Fund is on top of the \$2 billion we've already invested in Farm Household Allowance, Rural Financial Counselling, mental health funding, low-interest loans and more," he said.

The Government will work quickly to establish the Future Drought Fund Consultative Committee, who will work to engage with farmers and rural and regional communities to put in place rigorous governance arrangements for the appropriate selection and prioritisation of projects.

Minister for Drought and Rural Finance David Littleproud said the

Coalition was proud to deliver this legislation for our farmers and regional and rural Australia. "Australian drought policy now has a centrepiece and a guaranteed investment of \$100 million a year that no Minister can take away." Australians, Education, Government Services, Security, Foreign Policy, Energy, Climate Change, Education and online crime and safety also planned for reform.
