

IN AUSTRALIA OVER 116,000 PEOPLE EXPERIENCE **HOMELESSNESS ON ANY GIVEN NIGHT.**

Homelessness Week, August 1 - 7, aims to raise awareness of the impacts of homelessness on individuals and communities, including the effects on mental health, education, employment, and safety.

Roseberry Qld General Manager Michelle Coats said while there was no one definition of homelessness, access to safe and secure housing was one of the most basic human rights.

"Homelessness is not just about housing though, it is fundamentally about a lack of connectedness with family, friends and the community, and a lack of control over one's environment," she said.

Roseberry Qld, which provides a range of housing services, is hosting an event, Gladstone Homeless Connect, on August 3 to connect people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness with government and community support.

"Our aim is to bring together services providers from the government and community sector to create a 'one stop' shop for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness," Michelle said.

"At the event we are also launching concept plans for our Shelteristic Project, a community-led plan for addressing the dramatic increase in youth homelessness we have seen in Central Queensland over the past five

Michelle said anyone wanting to stay connected with homelessness issues, and learn ways in which they can make a difference, should connect with the Gladstone Homeless Connect Facebook Page.

"Homelessness is a complex issue, with a number of causes including financial pressures and a lack of affordable housing," she said.

"Everyone, including government, notfor-profit organisations and the wider community, needs to be involved in the conversation to work together towards a sustainable solution."

Homelessness Australia is holding a virtual event on August 2 for Homelessness Week.

Equity Economics Lead Economist Dr Angela Jackson will talk about her report, commissioned by Everybody's Home, on the benefits of providing long-term social housing to women who have experienced domestic and family violence.

This will be followed by a panel discussion with Shadow Housing and Homelessness Minister Jason Clare, Greens Spokesperson on Housing and Homelessness Senator Mehreen Faruqi and Everybody's Home Spokesperson Kate Colvin.

A sit-down with the LMP Gandidate for Flynn



GN) What has inspired you to make the move from state to federal politics?

CB) It's about taking representation of rural and regional Queensland to the next level. The opportunity has presented itself; the long-standing Member for Flynn Ken O'Dowd is retiring, he has held the seat for four terms, and it's an opportunity for me to take my views, my representation to the next level.

GN) What are you going to do for the people of Flynn if elected?

CB) The Flynn Electorate is a big electorate and revolves around the mining, resource, and agricultural sectors, very largely so. There are lots of people involved in the coal industry, in the power generation sector, in the resource sector, gas and big industry, and we also have a huge agriculture base that produces pretty much anything you can think of in terms of food and fibre. So, we need people who are strong advocates for those industries, for those people and all the people that support those industries. Those industries are the ones that are the economic engine room for the economy for the state of Queensland and Australia. We need to support these people and support their jobs and support what they're doing.

GN) What are your priorities for the region?

CB) There are lots of them. The port of Gladstone has the opportunity to expand into the future, so I advocate for Gladstone to be connected to the inland rail system that is currently being built Melbourne to Brisbane. I think there is a wonderful opportunity to include the port of Gladstone and Central Queensland in that rail link connectivity loop to ensure the future of the expansion of the port of Gladstone, to ensure the expansion of high value agriculture. Get the produce to the port, to the people, expand the port of Gladstone, container terminals, all those sorts of things.

Water is a really big issue that needs to be dealt with. Water is prosperity, it is life. We see Fairbairn Dam out at Emerald, for an example, which was built in 1971, that has provided for high value agriculture, for the mining and resource sectors to expand, and it has turned Emerald into a thriving rural, Central Queensland community. So, more water. We have got an open gorge dam at Taroom; it is Australia's largest shovel ready water project with all approvals in place. We should be building this dam, promoting further water security, both to the south and north. If we are going to have hydrogen production for example at Gladstone, which is proposed by the current state government, we need to solve the water issue, given the fact that you need 10 litres of water to produce a kilo of hydrogen it begs the question where the

water is coming from.

Water is an extremely important issue that needs to be furthered, and we need to build more water infrastructure. There are lots of small agriculture water infrastructure projects, particularly in the Burnett Water Catchment area, the Boyne Valley, people at Coalstoun Lakes, Mundubbera, all those projects need to be forwarded.

GN) Is there anything else you would like to add?

CB) The labour party in my view is beholden to the Greens, to the hard-left environmental argument. I think people must understand and consider what their jobs are in the electorate of Flynn. If you're in the mining and resource sector, coal-fired generation sector, at the aluminium plant, on Curtis Island in the gas industry, or in agriculture; which government is going to support you and your jobs into the future?

I would respectfully suggest that your chances are far better with a Morrison-Barnaby Joyce Coalition Government rather than an Albanese Government, given that they are in my view beholden to the Greens.

STARS ALIGN FOR CAPRICORN HIGHWAY UPGRADE TO GRACEMERE



WORK HAS WRAPPED UP ON A MAJOR UPGRADE OF THE CAPRICORN HIGHWAY BETWEEN ROCKHAMPTON AND GRACEMERE.

The jointly funded \$74.99 million project has improved travel times and safety between the Yeppen Roundabout and Gracemere.

The Capricorn Highway is Central Queensland's principal east-west freight corridor and is part of Australia's national Key Freight Route network, and is a main commuter route connecting the residents of Gracemere to Rockhampton City. The duplication focuses on capacity improvements to cater for traffic volumes that exceed 18,000 vehicles per day.

The project is duplicating a 5.2-kilometre section of the Capricorn Highway between

Rockhampton and Gracemere and is also delivering road enhancements on Gracemere Road, intersection upgrades and active transport infrastructure along the highway.

Federal Member for Flynn Ken O'Dowd said the project also delivered major upgrades to intersections at Fairy Bower Road/Old Gracemere Road and McLaughlin Street.

"These works were funded under the Federal Liberal and Nationals Government's \$600 million Northern Australia Roads Program," Mr O'Dowd said.

"This program has delivered upgrades to high-priority roads across Northern Queensland and indeed other jurisdictions that are essential to the movement of people and freight to support the region's economic development."

GLADSTONE AREA WATER BOARD HAS UNVEILED A NEW \$29 MILLION OFFLINE STORAGE FACILITY, **ENSURING UNINTERRUPTED** WATER SUPPLY FOR THE **GLADSTONE REGION.**

The facility holds 1,100 megalitres, which is about two weeks of water supply, and is a major boost for water services infrastructure in the region.

GAWB Chief Executive Officer Darren Barlow said the new facility will ensure the longevity of Awoonga Dam.

"The Offline Storage Facility is a significant investment towards advancing water reliability for our customers and the broader Gladstone Region," Mr Barlow said. "The facility allows us to safely undertake critical inspection and maintenance works without impacting our ability to provide continuous water supply."

Mr Barlow said the opening of the new facility is a significant milestone in GAWB's long-term capital works program.

"Much of the mechanical equipment at Lake Awoonga is over 25 years old and will require longer periods of time offline for inspection and maintenance in the coming years," Mr Barlow said.

Minister for Water Glenn Butcher said the successful delivery of the Offline Storage Facility shows the State Government can deliver Queensland reliable and cost-effective water infrastructure.

"As the operator of Gladstone's sole water source, Awoonga Dam, GAWB provides an essential service that promotes the economic development and enhances the lifestyle of regional Queensland," Mr Butcher said.

"This vital investment continues the ongoing development of an upgraded



water network that will improve security of water supply to the Gladstone Region and reinforce its appeal as a location for major industry development."

The facility operates the same way a dam does, using the surrounding hills and dam wall to hold water; the difference being that it is designed to hold water, not collect water from a catchment.

GAWB will spend more than \$170 million dollars on critical infrastructure upgrades and capital projects at Awoonga Dam over the next four years.

5-YES Halfway Progress Update

Queensland Alumina Limited (QAL) is the fourth largest alumina refinery in the world. We commenced production in March 1967 as Australia's first alumina refinery.

We produce around **3.7** million tonnes of the world's best smelter-grade alumina each year, used locally by Boyne Smelters Limited and shipped across the globe.

For over **53** years we have been producing alumina in Gladstone as one of the largest employers, generating billions of dollars of value for the Queensland economy.

In mid-2018 we committed to a **5-Year** Environment Strategy (5-YES) comprised of over **60** capital improvement projects and organisational culture change initiatives.

The program was a commitment made by QAL to deliver year-on-year improved environmental performance. With the investment increased from its original estimate of \$270M to a now fully scoped **\$400M**, the complex portfolio has been prioritised to improve environmental performance at QAL, reduce the risk of QAL impacting the receiving environment.



11,000 containers saved from landfill \$1,200 donated to local charities



Employees helping to create change by searching for environmentally sustainable alternatives. Our employee-driven team has so far eliminated styrofoam cups on site, implemented sustainable toilet paper and collected over 7,000 ear plugs for recycling through Terracycle.

The team is reviewing local supplier options for all site consumables and purchasing only the most sustainable option where available, eg. 100% recycled office paper and currently trialling biodegradable bin bags.

Projects are categorised into air quality, noise reduction, and the management of land and water.

Some projects are to reduce the likelihood that a process incident could impact local environments. Other projects provide reductions to odour, dust and alkali emissions. This mix of projects will help us sustainably reduce our environmental risk while also providing better day to day outcomes for our community.

Non-condensible gases from our digestion process are a large contributor to our odour emissions. While these gases are harmless to our community and environment, we recognise this odour is not pleasant and it is an ongoing priority for us to reduce them. We have two thermal oxidisers which destroy some of these gases. These act like a giant Bunsen burner, burning off any odorous gases that are able to be sent to it.

We have completed two projects, one to supplement the thermal oxidiser with a bigger, more efficient unit and the other to send additional odorous gases to the new unit.



Locals encouraged to support veterans this Vietnam Veterans' Day

ON AUGUST 18, THE 55TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE BATTLE OF LONG TAN, THE GLADSTONE REGION WILL COMMEMORATE VIETNAM VETERANS' DAY.

Gladstone RSL Subbranch President Ed Dahlheimer said it was important to remember the sacrifices of those who died, and say thank you to almost 60,000 Australians who served during the 10 years Australia was involved in the Vietnam War.

"The Vietnam War was Australia's longest military engagement of the 20th Century," he said.

"Between 1962 and 1972, 521 Australian soldiers tragically died and 3,000 were wounded.

"On Vietnam Veterans' Day, we pause and reflect on the bravery, teamwork and endurance that Australians displayed throughout the war.

"Vietnam Veterans are becoming thin on the ground, but those who are still with us will attend and it's important for us to show our support as many veterans didn't feel properly honoured for having serviced their country in Vietnam."

The Battle of Long Tan was a significant moment in Australia's war in Vietnam.

On August 18, 1966, in a rubber plantation near the village of Long Tan, Australian soldiers fought one of their fiercest battles.

The men of Delta Company, 6th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment faced a force of some 2000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops.

The battle was fought in wet and muddy conditions during a heavy tropical downpour.

By the end of the day, 17 Australians had been killed in action, and 25 were wounded, this was the largest number of casualties in a single operation since the Australian Task Force had established its base at nearby Nui Dat the previous April.

The Gladstone Region Vietnam Veterans Day service will take place on August 18 at ANZAC Park from 10:30 am.

Ed said it was important that all veterans,

ex-service men and women and their families and residents know they will "be made most welcome at our service".

"The aim of the service is to support our veterans and provide them with the sense of belonging that they deserve," he said.

"Hopefully we will have a large attendance on the 18th and this will be achieved.

"So please, everyone, come and join us."

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New group to provide support for those with lung disease

FOR SHIRLEY DWYER THE TIPPING POINT **CAME WHEN SHE WAS SITTING IN HER CAR TRYING TO GET HER BREATH BACK** AFTER DOING HER SHOPPING.

Diagnosed with Alpha-1 Antitrypsin Deficiency in 2015, an uncommon condition that causes lung disease, Shirley looked up and saw another man with a large oxygen bottle draped over his car, also struggling to get his breath back.

"I thought 'you poor bugger', you need some support," she said.

"I had not had access to a lung disease support group, either in Brisbane or here in Gladstone, and we need it."

Shirley plans to establish the Gladstone & District Lung Support Group to provide emotional and educational support for those such as herself who suffer from lung disease.

"I want to bring in professionals to talk about diet and exercise, as well as **Speech Therapists** and Respiratory Specialists," she said.

"Future planning is, with help from medical experts, to get the pulmonary rehabilitation back up and running.



"I also want to provide support for family, friends and carers as they carry a heavy emotional load as well."

Shirley said the plan was to hold monthly support meetings unless there was a demand for more frequent meetings.

"The group will also be listed on the Australian Lung Foundation website, and they have been very helpful in getting this support group up and running," she said.

The first meeting of the Gladstone & District Lung Support Group will take place on August 13 at the Gladstone Men's Shed, located at 18 Moura Crescent in Barney Point, from 10am.

Anyone with a lung disease is welcome to attend.

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NEW FUNDING FOR community sport recovery

LOCAL SPORT AND ACTIVE RECREATION CLUBS ARE ENCOURAGED TO APPLY FOR UP TO \$150,000 UNDER A NEW FUND FOR DEVELOPING OR UPGRADING PLAYING FIELDS TO GET MORE QUEENSLANDERS INVOLVED IN SPORT AND PHYSICAL ACTIVITY.

Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said the Active Gameday Projects Fund would help the economic recovery of the sport and recreation industry by investing in smaller scale infrastructure that benefits local communities.

"Our sport clubs are at the heart of Gladstone's community," he said.

"This is a great opportunity for Gladstone Region clubs to apply for funding to back needed projects.

"The Active Gameday Projects fund will help them get back on their feet, freshen up their facilities for existing members, and encourage new sign ups.

Examples of projects that could receive funding include developing or upgrading playing surfaces and installing or upgrading irrigation and field lighting.
