In 2021, local Gladstone yacht Wistari matched Laurabada's record for the most number of race starts at 51.





1957 saw the slowest race in history with winning yacht Alvis, skippered by Fred Markwell, limp across the line in a time of 95 hours, 9 minutes and 1 second, and an average speed of 3.24 knots.

In 1972, Cyclone Emily hit and winds reached up to 96 knows. There were 25 race starters and 20 of those retired.





In 2018, Peter Harburg realised a lifelong goal with his Supermaxi Blackjack by smashing the race record, arriving in Gladstone only 16 hours, 53 minutes and 37 seconds after they started!

## FIVE LOCAL GROUPS SHARE N \$200,000 FOR COMMUNITY PROJECTS

SHELL'S QGC COMMUNITIES FUND HAS SUPPLIED FIVE LOCAL COMMUNITY GROUPS FROM ACROSS THE GLADSTONE REGION WITH A SHARED \$200,000 OF FUNDING TO DELIVER KEY PROJECTS ACROSS THE REGION.

The grants will fund upgrades to several different local programs which will improve the lives of hundreds of Gladstone Region residents. These include upgrades to community hubs and sporting grounds, improvements to local sports clubs and a program which is helping address domestic and family violence.

One of this year's recipient group's is Gladstone Women's Health Centre (GWHC). GWHC Director Patricia Lisle said that the grant will fund the extension of the Men's Education Network (MENs), which is included in a suite of programs that aim to help address domestic and family violence in the region.

"It's helping us to provide a safe network of support for men to address abusive behaviour by focusing on negative behaviours, family breakdown and the judicial system, while improving the safety and wellbeing of women and families," Ms Lisle said.

"The program's focus is to increase men's understanding about the impact of their behaviours on others and enable strong social networks that support positive behaviours. In turn, the outcome is that men will be more productive, positive and effect people; and better fathers, husbands and partners."

Shell's QGC business LNG Asset Manager Krishna Venkatesan said the annual Communities Fund grants help volunteer-led, not-for-profit groups deliver programs and projects that make a difference to the community.

'For groups such as these, raising funds takes an enormous amount of time and effort by people who volunteer on top of their work and family commitments. The Shell's QGC Communities Fund grants give grassroots community groups a helping hand to fast-track projects, for the benefit of the wider community," Mr Venkatesan said.

'This means our locals have access to improved facilities and more opportunities to take active roles in building a safer community.

"Our shell QGC team, the majority of whom are locals and many of whom volunteer themselves, are humbled to play a small part in helping these community championships make a real difference to our region," Mr Venkatesan said.

This year was also the first time that joint applications were submitted to the program, which encouraged collaboration between local groups.

Rotary Club of Calliope successfully applied for funds to complete major upgrades at the Chapman Park Grounds, a central venue for events in the Calliope community. The project will include the construction of a new five-bay shed, electrical work and the instillation of solar power.

The Gladstone Seafarer's Centre will be launching the event in Auckland Creek at 3pm, with spectators encouraged to watch from East Shores.

he derby will take place under the Harbour Festival umbrella of events, which is why the event will be taking place on Good Friday. The Gladstone Seafarer's Centre manager, Melinda Anderson, says that the timing of events has worked to their advantage.

"Due to the Brisbane to Gladstone yacht race launching on the same day, Auckland Creek has extra pontoons and far less traffic than normal, making for ideal racing conditions for our ducks. Our new location is also more family-friendly with easy accessibility for all to attend," said Melinda.

The event will operate as the Gladstone Seafarer's Centre's major fundraiser for the year, and since the program is a notfor-profit dedicated to the welfare of those on the water, the idea of a duck derby is perfectly fitting.

"Duck Derbies are held all around the world and we think they're a hilariously good time. We even have two little duck costumes that the people of Gladstone may see us galivanting around in while we try and sell tickets.

Are you concerned about possible waste going in to our ocean?

"Don't worry," Melinda assured me, "We've been really fortunate to have the support of Maritime Safety Queensland again this year. They will be dropping the ducks off from their boat 'The Badger' with a huge net to drop our ducks from, and they will also have some of the gear they use to contain oil spills that have floats to contain our little ducks in at the end of the racecourse.

"We would really love to see as many people crammed along the shore line as possible. The ducks will be dumped into the water right out the front of East Shores, so it's a perfect spot for people to watch.

"We also have a simultaneous race that has larger dinner-plate-sized ducks in it. These are the 'Quackens' and have been purchased by local businesses to go in the running for a separate prize. Most of these businesses are also going in the running for the hotly contested prize of 'bestdressed duck'."

## CELEBRATES 103 YEARS

The Mt Larcom Show is making a return this year, and it's expected to be bigger and better than ever.

ith last year's attendance numbers topping 10,000 patrons- an increase in 1500 from the previous year- the event's organiser Kaylene Hooley said that this number is still likely to grow.

"Last year's show had record numbers, which was an increase from the previous show two years ago, and we expect this growth to continue. Each year we build on the last with different entertainment and some highlight events," said Kaylene.

"This year we have some shows making a return, like the Kangagang Children's Show, the Reptile Kingdom Show, Hellyhoops Hula Show, free facepainting and a free climbing wall. New to the show this year is EI-Jay Motorcycles show, the live fish tank and buskers in the Entertainment Tent on stage.

"On the Saturday night in the centre ring we have live woodchop demonstrations, the EI-Jay night show, Fireworks, and to end the night we'll have 'Seven Whales in Moscow', a great local band, playing in the bar area.

"This is not even to mention all the regular events and displays that we have such as Pavilions, Poultry, Birds, Animal Nursery with the Mt Larcom School petting zoo. We'll have competitions galore, a Dog Show, Chainsaw and Woodchops, Beef Judging and Horse events. The Old Stationary Engines, Historical Household Items, and Old Tractor Displays grow each year and are very popular."

Along with this massive selection of events, the show will be hosting the National Woodchop Championship, and will also see a return of 'Side-Show Alley'.

While all the events at the show help to draw in massive crowds, the most popular are the Chainsaw, Woodchopping and the Stationary Engines Displays.

"Of course, families with younger children are more attracted to the kid's entertainment like face painting, animal exhibitions and show rides.

"We also noticed last year that the Saturday night-time events had record crowds staying late to watch the entertainment on display."

The Mt Larcom Show has been operational since 1919, and has been continual since then except for breaks taken during the years of both World Wars. In 2021, the Show Society celebrated 81 years of presenting the annual agricultural show.

"In 2022, we are proud to say that it has now been 103 years since the first agricultural show."

In the early 2000's, many members of the wider community realised the scale and quality of the show, and volunteer numbers increased dramatically.

"Resulting from this was the expansion of events and displays, especially in recent history. We have even had the Queensland Agricultural Show Body advise us that we have gone against the 'trend' of Agricultural shows fading and folding, so they now class us as a premium show. This is simply due to hard work, and the excellent support of the local community, Council, Businesses and Industries."

## EASTER EGG Trupples

Get the kids in the kitchen to help you make this recipe. These Easter Egg truffles are colourful, sweet and the perfect Easter treat.

They also make great gifts, but we're certain they'll be eaten before you can give them away!

#### INGREDIENTS

- 600g Packet Green's Vanilla Mud Cake mix
- 2 Australian free range eggs
- ¼ cup (60 mils) vegetable oil
- 2tsp finely grated orange rind
- 2tbsp orange juice
- 400g white choc melts
- Red, blue, green and yellow liquid food colouring
- Rainbow sprinkles or confetti, to decorate

#### METHOD

Step 1 | Preheat oven to 170°C. Grease a 20cm (base measurement) round cake pan. Line the base with baking paper.

Step 2 | Prepare the cake mix using the eggs, oil and ½ cup (125ml) water following packet directions. Pour into prepared pan. Bake for 45 mins or until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Turn onto a wire rack to cool completely.

Step 3 | Line a tray with baking paper. Crumble the cake into a large bowl. Add the icing mix from the packet with the orange rind and orange juice. Stir until the mixture comes together. Roll 1-tbs portions of mixture into oval shapes. Place on the lined tray. Freeze for 15 mins.

Step 4 | Meanwhile, place the choc melts in a heatproof bowl over a saucepan of simmering water (make sure the bowl doesn't touch the water). Stir until melted. Divide into 4 bowls. Use food colouring to tint the chocolate pale pink, blue, green and yellow.

Step 5 | Dip 1 cake ball in melted pink chocolate, shaking off excess. Place on lined tray. Repeat with remaining cake balls and chocolate, alternating between different colours. Top with sprinkles or confetti.

Step 6 | Spoon the remaining chocolate into 4 sealable plastic bags. Cut off 1 corner of each bag. Drizzle truffles with chocolate. Set aside for 10 mins or until set.
