Celebrating 110 years of Gladstone Ports

Gladstone Ports
Corporation (GPC)
is commemorating a
significant milestone
in its history - marking
110 years of operation.
This milestone solidifies
its standing as one of
Australia's foremost
ports, underscoring its
pivotal role in both the
Queensland and national
economies.

The supercentenarian birthday is official on March 6th, 110 years since the Gladstone Harbour Board first met in 1914 at the Gladstone Town Hall.

The historical records of GPC unveil a rich legacy, from the transportation of horses to India in 1894 to handling over 120 million tonnes of diverse commodities today.

One of its earliest trade ventures, established in 1929 at Auckland Point in collaboration with the British Imperial Oil Company (now Shell), involved the construction of tanks for petroleum storage, a partnership that endures to this day. This marked the genesis of GPC's journey. By 1930, the port had already exported more than 58,000 tonnes of coal worldwide.

Fast forward to 2024: GPC is now the world's fourth largest coal exporting terminal, handling more than 34 products including LNG, aluminium, petroleum and timber. Since the establishment of Reg Tanna Coal Terminal (RGTCT) in May 1980, we have totalled 1.5 billion tonnes of coal exports.

GPC's CEO Craig Haymes said the ports sector is a major contributor employment and future job opportunities with many jobs across the State linked to export/import of trade from ports like GPC.

As an employer of more than 750 staff, GPC contributes to economic activity that supports thousands of additional jobs and generates billions of dollars in gross value add for the broader Central Queensland economy.

"Today, GPC facilitates more than 120 million tonnes of throughput a year, with a record dividend of \$117 million delivered to the State's economy last year for the benefit of all Queenslanders," Mr Haymes said.

"By leveraging our extensive operating experience across our three operational ports we are strengthening GPC's position as one of the world's leading multicommodity ports, contributing to Queensland's economy and demonstrating our role in building a sustainable and prosperous future for Queensland and the nation," he said.

"We are focused on ensuring continuity and stability for the business and exploring exciting new opportunities like assisting in transforming Australia's energy landscape.

"To our teams, our customers and the communities in which we operate, thank you for your continued and valued support as we facilitate sustainable trade and development and provide prosperity to the region for another 100 plus years."

GPC is more than a port, it boasts award-winning parklands, serves as the base for Gladstone Marine Pilot Services handling over 1900 vessel movements, hosts the finish line for the prestigious Brisbane to Gladstone Yacht Race, now in its 76th year, and organizes Central Queensland's largest fun run. This event raised over \$70,000 in a single day for schools and the community in 2023.

Tynn Election Promises

Hundreds of promised projects remain stalled nearly two years after Federal Labor outlines its commitments during the 2022 election, as per documents recently disclosed to Parliament.

olin Boyce, the Federal
Member for Flynn, criticised
the bureaucratic hurdles
imposed by the Albanese Government,
asserting that organisations and
councils in Flynn have been unjustly
subjected to prolonged processes.

"Our community has been forced to jump through the Albanese Government's hoops just to receive the funding that was promised to them before Labor were elected," Mr Boyce said.

"Here in Flynn, 4 projects have failed to commence and are still being held up by Labor's incompetence." The delayed projects in Flynn encompass: Stage 3B of the Biloela Raedon Street Industrial Estate, Boyne Tannum Sharks Football Club Clubhouse Facilities, Gladstone Regional Indoor Sports Complex and Aquatic Centre for Boyne Island and Tannum Sands.

"These delays demonstrate the low regard the Albanese Government has for Flynn Community groups and councils have been left in the lurch by Labor after they promised these projects would be delivered." Senator Bridget McKenzie, Shadow Infrastructure Minister, echoed concerns over the widespread impact of Albanese's delays, emphasising their unfair consequences for towns, regions, and suburbs across Australia.


"Communities across the nation gave Mr Albanese his Prime Ministership off the back of these promises, and with 98.7 per cent of projects incomplete nationally, and 60 per cent not yet agreed and contracted, it exposes Labor's warped priorities," Senator McKenzie said.

Senator McKenzie criticised the Albanese Labor Government for squandering time and resources on divisive campaigns like the \$450 million Voice Referendum initiative instead of prioritising muchneeded community infrastructure. "The Albanese Labor Government has wasted much of the past two years distracted by its disastrous and divisive \$450 million Voice Referendum campaign, instead of delivering much needed community infrastructure."

"Since being elected, Prime Minister Albanese has abolished \$10 billion in regional and community programs and his government has bungled the delivery of projects Labor promised at the election."

BLESSING AND NAMING OF WMR Gladstone's new rescue vessel

Volunteer Marine Rescue Gladstone (VMRG) was originally formed in 1971 as the Port Curtis Air Sea Rescue Association.

n 1983, it was renamed, after affiliating with the representative state body, Volunteer Marine Rescue Association Queensland Inc. (VMRAQ).

VMRG provides marine search and rescue services to the boating public on a volunteer basis. Our area of responsibility is generally from Cape Capricorn in the north to Bustard Head in the south, and 50 nautical miles seaward to reef islands. In cooperation

with Gladstone Harbour Control, a 24 hour watch is effectively maintained on VHF Channels 16 and 82.

Annually, Volunteer Marine Rescue Gladstone is called to undertake around 70 incidents covering search and rescue, breakdowns, groundings, and medical evacuations. Additionally, assistance is provided for the Brisbane to Gladstone yacht race, Boyne Tannum Hookup, and some Port Curtis Sailing Club races.

On 24th February, our new vessel Gladstone Rescue 1, was blessed and named. Planning for the new vessel commenced in late 2018 with the establishment of a committee to review activations and identify features needed in a new vessel with a focus on the safety of our crew and passengers. Through many planning sessions, the final design was a 12m aluminium catamaran with wave piercing bows, walkalong side of cabin at the deck level, flybridge and diesel engines with

jet drives. We engaged Jon Pattie as the Naval Architect and went to tender for boat builders with Allweld Manufacturing at Tinana being successful.

The result of all the hard work of many volunteers, Jon Pattie and


Allweld is Gladstone Rescue 1.

The blessing and naming ceremony of our new rescue vessel follows part of a nautical tradition rooted in ancient times. Captains used red wine to make a sacrifice to the sea gods and to celebrate with a toast. The branch full of green leaves placed on the bow of the vessel symbolises safe returns and will remain on the vessel until after its maiden vovage. Monsignor John Butler AM blessed Gladstone Rescue 1 with holy water.

"Our new vessel looks impressive, but more importantly meets our expectations of performing well" said President Jeff Caldwell. "Providing our crew and passengers with a safer platform to perform activations when the weather is not so kind was an integral part of the design of the vessel" said Jeff.

Thanks goes to all the VMR Gladstone team who have made the new vessel and event possible.

As part of our continuous crew training, the team now have a new vessel to work with and Gladstone Rescue 1 has swung into action providing assistance out on the water.
